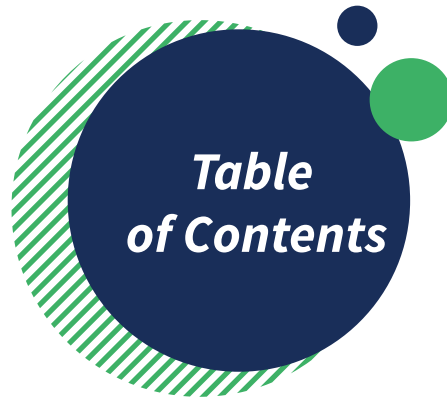

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FROM THE DESK OF OUR CHAIRMAN

MUCH TO GIVE THANKS FOR AND MORE TO LOOK FORWARD TO

Our birthday year has arguably been the most challenging for the country and the school. However, we made it to **20 years**, an impressive feat for a small island with a population of 80,000 without a “social net” to help through tough times.

COVID-19 initially hit Antigua with devastating consequences forcing lockdowns which lead to a major contraction of the island’s primary revenue stream- tourism, the immediate closure of our school, as well as lay-offs, redundancies and total business closures for many of our families. Fast-forward to today, we now have 5 different vaccines for the population to choose from. At present, vaccination is compulsory for all school staff and students aged 12-17. Our Island Academy community has responded well, and we were proud to be the first school in the country to return to face-to-face learning after the lockdowns.

As a school, our core values remain unshakeable, but on a practical level, daily life for our community has been revolutionized. As an organization we have taken this opportunity to re-evaluate our school structure. I am delighted to share that from August 2021 Portia Moursy, who has led the school since 2014, has been appointed to the position of Executive Principal and our Vice Principal Sophie Bown is now our Principal. For our teachers and administrators, new leadership and management positions have been created as our curriculum and teaching methods have diversified so much since March 2020.

We are looking at our future with excitement. A new classroom block has been completed which allows us to restore dedicated Music and Art rooms. The additional space gives us the much-needed capacity to accept more students from our waiting list. The development of our campus remains a necessary priority for all our students. With increased physical space, we are able to reach more underserved students and to produce more academic, athletic, and community programs.

Without you, we certainly would not have been able to remain afloat and be in the healthy financial position in which we find ourselves today. A sincere thank you to all that helped us through this very difficult period.

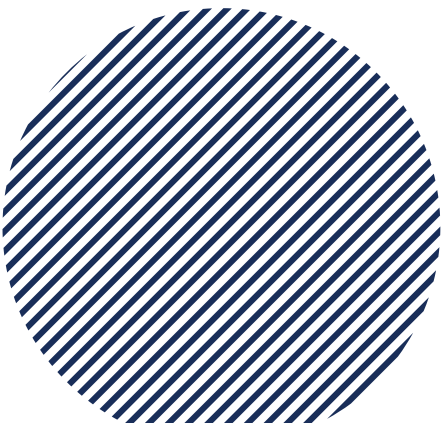

TO MORE SUCCESSFUL 21ST CENTURY LEARNERS

When our doors opened in **September 2001** twenty years ago, the world was being forced to recalibrate. Fast forward to 2021, we find ourselves adapting again.

Humanity is overcoming a very different but significant challenge to our shared future. As a school community, from our Kindergarteners to our IB students, our mission has never been clearer; to educate and nurture the next generation of 21st century leaders. Our 2021 IBDP graduates are the embodiment of this very mission! The class achieved a 100% diploma pass rate with scores above international averages. Our 2021 valedictorian followed in the footsteps of his 2020 counterpart and both young men are now undergraduates, with scholarships, at Columbia University in NYC. Their classmates are also performing in top universities and colleges across Europe and North America. In the primary school our Grade 6 students blew the school's academic records sky-high with their record-breaking performance in the national Common Entrance Exams. Nearly half of the class placed in the 'Top 100' scholars in the entire country.

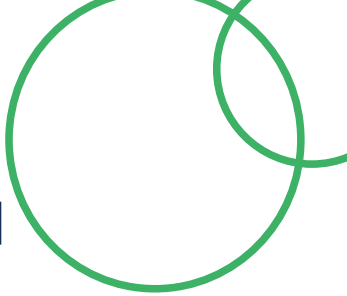

FINANCIAL REPORT 2020-2021

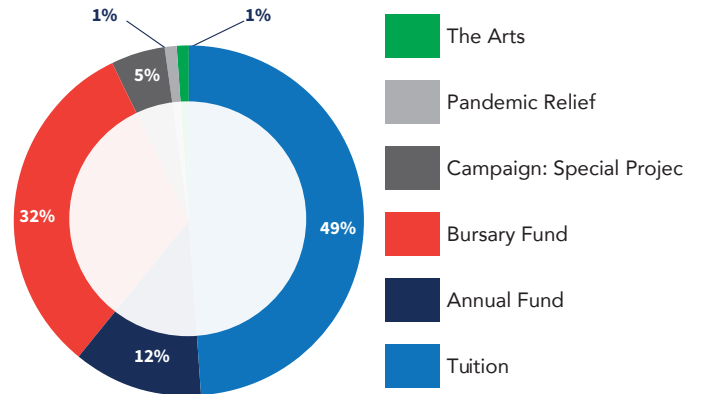
It is clear. Without your donations, our school would not be where it is today. Over the past 20 years, you have supported bursaries, facilitated teaching excellence and allowed us to create learning spaces that enable our students to develop into 21st century learners.

2020-2021 was a satisfactory year of operation despite the difficulties that persisted due to the COVID-19 pandemic. The majority of funding we receive continues to be invested directly into where it matters most, our students. 58% of your financial gifts this past year have gone directly to our Bursary Program to support 112 students, our highest number of financially supported students to date.

Being able to operate effectively, especially in the face of change, has become part of the IA legacy. Thanks to your investment into our annual and campaign fund, we were able to retain our cadre of world-class teachers and administrators, we maintained the operation of our campus and successfully navigated between campus and remote-learning through numerous learning and communication platforms.

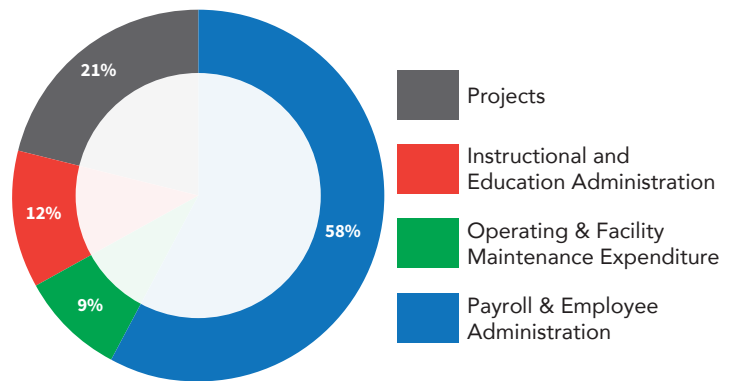

KAROL LYN'S STORY: A LOOK THROUGH THE YEARS

Karol Lyn Edwards has the distinction of being the longest standing faculty member of Island Academy. Having taught at IA for almost the entire duration of its existence, she has seen first hand the development of the school. Here she reflects on her years at IA.



Happy **20th Anniversary** Island Academy!! Wow! 20 years! I remember that day in December 2001 as if it was yesterday: eagerly entering a small office in Falmouth Harbour to talk with Bronwyn and Bernadette about coming to teach at a brand-new school. We spoke about the great visions and potential for what was then a very small school. They were bursting with excitement and passion. It was infectious. I also remember walking down a short road to the school itself. It was breaktime and the students were outside, some playing, others relaxing. With classrooms set against a beautiful turquoise beach shaded by palm trees, I thought, “who wouldn’t want to work here?”

I moved back to Antigua a few months later, March 2002, to start teaching at Island Academy. Back then, the secondary school consisted of grades 7 – 9. Our classrooms were converted apartments and the beach and sea were our backdrop. Though we did not have many resources at that time, we strived for academic excellence and made the best of what we did have. We had invaluable lessons there from watching several sharks feeding right outside our classroom door to watching a baby goat be delivered. With these special shared experiences and small numbers, we quickly became a family.

From the very beginning of Island Academy, Bernadette wanted to offer a world-class education to all Antiguan regardless of economic status. One of the ways this was possible was to offer the IB program and preparations started almost immediately for us to become an IB accredited school. IA’s reputation spread, and our numbers began to grow. In 2009, we moved to a single campus in the centre of the island. This new campus housed our primary and secondary students with students as young as 4 and as old as 18. Though we grew larger, we are still very much a family with Administration and Auntie B as Bernadette is affectionately called,

knowing every student by name. We surpassed our original numbers five-fold and went through many other changes. From 4-walled rooms with blackboards, today we now have classrooms with projectors, a fully equipped science lab, a ceramics studio, an art room and a music room and a laptop and ipad program. Still, the vision has remained the same “to offer a world-class education that will enable our diverse community of students to function successfully, both academically and socially, in the global community”.

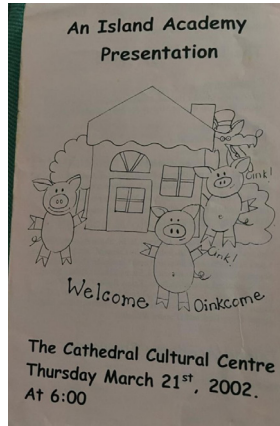
As the school’s IB coordinator and a faculty member for many years, I have been fortunate to witness the development of scores of students. From our first graduates to our most recent graduates, we have had a bevy of students of various means and backgrounds compete for university placements with the best students from across the globe and successfully matriculate to world renowned universities. Parents frequently approach me to thank IA for preparing their children for tertiary education and for life inside and outside of Antigua. For them, Island Academy has opened so many doors for their children through the bursary and scholarship program and the college counselling offered by the school to help students decide their next steps. I am truly honored to be part of this special family and to see the bright future that lies ahead for so many more of our students.



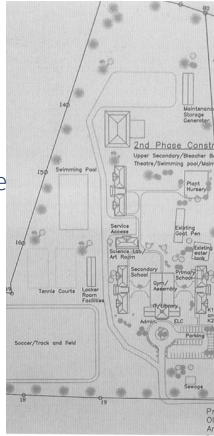
LOOK HOW FAR WE'VE COME - A TIMELINE

DONOVAN'S STORY: IA, AN EXPERIENCE I WILL NEVER FORGET



Donovan Skepple is a 2015 IB graduate who joined us in Grade 4 back in 2004. He was a recipient of bursary support for the duration of his time at IA. Following the completion of the IB program, Donovan went on to Suffolk University in Boston where he pursued a BA Advertising, Digital Media and Public Relations Major and excelled in many spheres. He shares his story below.

When I first started Island Academy, the school was still very new. My mother had been sold on the promise of an international education for students who attended and the opportunities such education would provide. Both she and I are happy that she made the decision for me to join IA.

If I had to describe my time at Island Academy I wished I could paint a perfect picture of the high school experience with anecdotes of being a paragon of studiousness. Then that wouldn't be accurate because high school is not perfect because life isn't perfect, especially for a certain stubborn young man who would learn the value of hard work the not so easy way.

If I had to describe my time pursuing my IB diploma at Island Academy, I would say it was hard and sometimes downright excruciating. I had many sleepless nights and so many hand cramps from so many papers. Yet somehow, I look back at every moment so fondly. I

look back at my educators who shaped me into the person I am today. They constantly pressured and pushed me to be better and trust me, most times I didn't make it easy for them. I remain grateful to them for putting up with me.

Thanks to my diploma, I got into Suffolk University. My experience there was quite exceptional. I was able to graduate with honors and held several posts. I was a Senator for my Class as well as our Chair for the Student Government Association's Diversity Committee. I was also the Public Relations Chair for the Honors Committee as well as Public Relations Director for our student Arts Magazine. However, it was at IA where my confidence and belief in my abilities really took off. Today, I work in financial technologies and banking at the LendingClub bank, one of the top digital banks in the market overseeing sales, operations and client relations for numerous major US cities, labor unions, large fintechs and other large banks. In my interactions, I carry with me lessons learnt from being at IA.

I look back at my classmates, some of the most exceptional, creative, humorous and clever human beings I have ever met. One proverb in particular comes to mind when I think of them. "You use steel to sharpen steel, and one friend sharpens another." My classmates truly inspired me with their unique perspectives and insights. The ethos at IA and of my IB education was to challenge myself constantly not just in the boundaries of academics but how I viewed the world around myself. Makhella went on to study medicine in Cuba and is now a licensed doctor at the Mount St. John's Medical Centre here in Antigua.



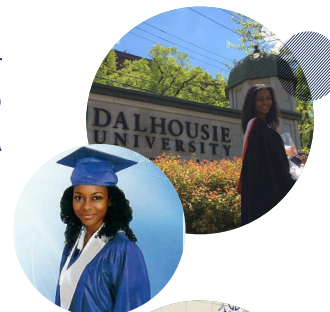
Careisha Whyte (IB Graduate, Class of 2012)
